State College Answers

QUESTION: What causes tobacco plants to button prematurely?
ANSWER: Premature buttoning is generally associated with plants that have grown under cold weather conditions in the field, and cold, wet conditions followed by dry weather in the field. The quality of the plants may also affect the amount of early budding.
QUESTION: Do pines in thick stands compete for water?
ANSWER: Yes. Tests have shown that too many trees on an acre of soil create serious water shortage for all of them. On some light or compact soils this may occur within 10 days after a good rain. Adequate soil water is available for a much longer time where pines have been thinned.
