

The opposition party member said that he may not return to his homeland as long as Prime Minister Nkrumah's government is in power.

Under the Ghana Preventive Detention Act more that 40 supporters of the opposition. United Party has been jailed. Dr. Busia is concerned about the atmosphere of suppression suffered by the opposition party. He accused Prime Minister Nkrumah of having a personality cult and of acting like Hitler of Germany in some of his moves.
