Two Appointed At NC College

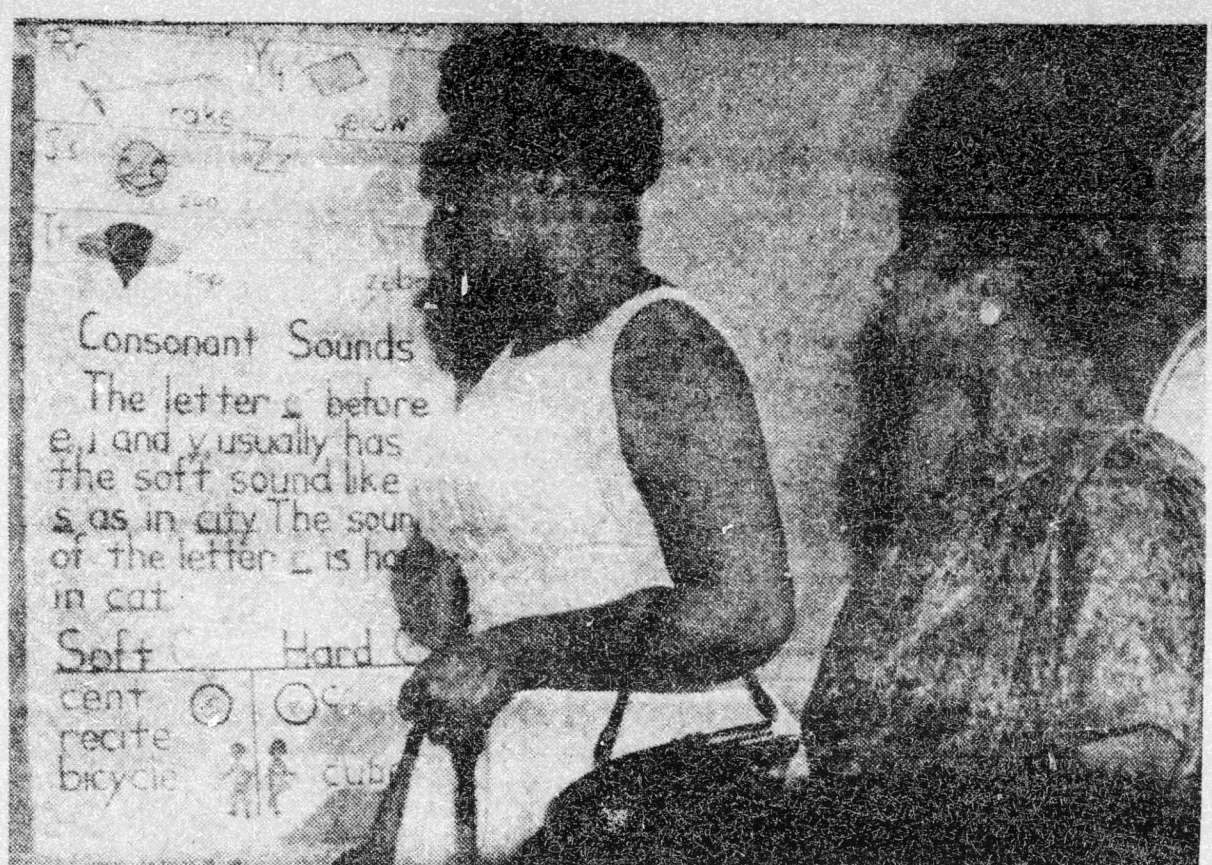

He received his B.A. from Dillard University and his M.S. from Tuskegee Institute. Before coming to NCC, McMillan taught at Fort Valley State College, Fort Valley, Ga.

MONTGOMERY (AP)—Booker T. Sykes and James Turner, both Negroes, were selected last Monday to serve on the 18 member Montgomery county grand jury slated to consider the case of a Negro charged with raping a housewife.

The men were chosen by a lot from a venire of 90 prospective jurors. Sykes is an employee of the Veterans Administration and Turner is a waiter. Any 12 of the 18 grand jurors can return an indictment.

Yes, We All Talk By Marcus H. Boulware

HELP THEM TALK
Many children have speech defects. We say that speech is defective when we listen more to how something is said than to what is being said, when because of omissions, substitutions, distortions, lack of rhythm or smoothness, we are unable to understand the speaker easily. Defective speech may sometimes be caused by organic abnormalities. In this group are:
1. Cleft palate (where there is an opening between the oral and the nasal cavities);
2. Cerebral palsy (damage to the area of the brain serving the muscles of speech);
3. Aphasia (damage to association areas of the brain);
4. Paralysis of or abnormal structure of organs of articulation;
5. Dental abnormalities such as open bite or badly spaced teeth, and
6. Deafness.
On the other hand, we have functional speech defects. A functional defect is the result of faulty learning. The organs of articulation function properly but the child has established an incorrect speech pattern which has become an ingrained habit.

Twins Find Fortunes In North - - Not West

"Go West, young man, go West," was not the counsel heeded by the Ford, twin brothers of Hemingway, S. C. Instead they went North to find their fortunes. Desiring to further their education in another area, the twins heard of a new Adventist school opening just outside Pottstown, Pa., and planned to enroll there in 1946. When they arrived on the campus, they had \$140 between them. They told the principal of Pine Forge institute, Prof. J. L. Moran, that they had to work most of their statement off—their parents were not able to help them much. He understood their problem and told them there was enough work so they could get an education and still pay off their tuition, if they meant business. The school itself was pioneering and there were many jobs. Their first assignment was ditch-digging at 22 cents an hour. Since they were twins, they were always given the same job, because it was discovered they worked best that way. All that school year, they dug ditches. During the summer, the boys returned to South Carolina to do student colporteur work. With this, they were able to earn scholarships and return to Pine Forge in September. Their work at the school must have pleased the faculty, because the pay was raised to 35 cents an hour. The Allegheny conference which supports the school, also gave them a part-time job in the afternoons. During their second year, the Ford twins met Elder H. D. Dobbin, a minister in the Allegheny conference, and conference builder. He talked with them about the building trade and they began to work under his supervision. By vacation time, they had earned enough money to pay all their bills and have some left over for the entrance fee for the third year.
