ORGANIZING A SPEECH

QUESTION: My main fault in preparing an address is that my speeches are not well-organized. I seem to ramble, never getting any place. What would you suggest?—Mrs. T. H. G.

ANSWER: The matter of organization requires orderly thinking and discipline of mind. The main idea of most speeches can be subdivided into several sub-ideas. Recently, the pastor of the St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Nashville, took for his text a verse from the Songs of Solomon, Chapter 2, verse 15, which said: "Catch us the foxes, the little foxes, that spoil the vineyards, for our vineyards are in bloom."

The major idea was that the little things in life count most. It is the little things that bring about our down fall in most cases.

The minister's main points centered around these sub-ideas: (1) the fox of frustration, (2) the fox of fear, and (3) the fox of fatigue. From this basic structure a wonderful sermon was developed. Members of a congregation are no longer contented with a long drawn-out narration of a Bible story. The minister therefore must get to the ball.

Alabama Senate Passes School Secession Bill

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (ANP) — A bill giving schools threatened with integration the right to secede from state, county, and city systems and form their own was approved by the Alabama Senate last week.

The Senate passed the bill by a vote of 30 to 0 and sent it to the House.

It is believed that, at best, the bill could only delay integration. The federal courts are opposed to such efforts to thwart court-ordered integration, especially where state funds are involved.
