Nearly 1,000 Freshmen Will Enter A & T This Fall

Freshman Week Begins At Fayetteville September 8

FAYETTEVILLE — Freshman Orientation Week will begin at the Fayetteville State Teachers College on Tuesday, September 8 and the dormitories will be formally opened at 2:00 o'clock P. M. on that date.

To date nearly three hundred freshmen and transfer students, present records indicate, will come from ten states and the District of Columbia as follows — New York, New Jersey, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, Florida, Michigan, Ohio, South Carolina, North Carolina, and the District of Columbia.

As in other years, a preponderance of these live in North Caro-

lina. The present figure, according to Dean Lafayette Parker, Director of Admissions, runs above that of last year.

The newcomers will be subjected to a six-day round of activities calculated to acquaint them to their new environment and otherwise to aid them in getting off to a splendid start in their college study.

Assisting the faculty in the business of orientation will be a committee of upper-class students chaired by Thelma Forbes, junior of Goldsboro and Eva Gordon, junior of Jamesville.

GREENSBORO — Freshman enrollment at A&T College for the coming fall quarter might come near the 1,000 mark.

This is the opinion of C. R. A. Cunningham, registrar who said last week that more than 900 students had already been admitted. The report showed that number of applications were yet to be processed awaiting the receipt of his school transcript.

He said that the freshman class will easily exceed that of last year by at least 100 students.

The entering students will arrive at the college on Sunday, Sept. 6 and will begin the rounds of freshman orientation on the following morning. The freshman orientation program and registration will consume the full week.

ALBANY, Ga. — Miss M. Lee Walker has been appointed Dean of Students of Albany State College by President W. H. Dennis, Jr. The new dean is a graduate of the Student Dean Program in Syracuse (N.Y.) University, earning the M.A. degree and beginning post-graduate work there. During the two-year Student Dean Training Program, she directed both freshman and upperclassmen living centers.

Miss Walker, who attended Western Reserve University and Penn College in her hometown of Cleveland, Ohio, completed her undergraduate work at Morris Brown College, Atlanta, while serving as secretary to the Dean of Students on that campus.

Among honors earned as an undergraduate in the three schools are her inclusion in "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities", Delta Ep-

ilon Honor Society; President of the Intercollegiate Personnel Council; and recipient of a total of 7 academic and achievement awards.

Miss Walker has received two American Friends Service Committee Study Grants as an undergraduate she spent a summer studying at Pendle Hill, the Quaker Graduate School at Wallingford, where she concentrated on international problems with the adult representatives of 22 nations who made up the student body.

In addition to her AFSC studies, Miss Walker has spent four summers as a volunteer for the organization. Outstanding among these being her work with the Mestizos of San Simon Atzitzintla, Puebla, Mexico and at Camojimila, Morelos, Mexico and with the Indians of San Salvador, El Salvador, Central America.

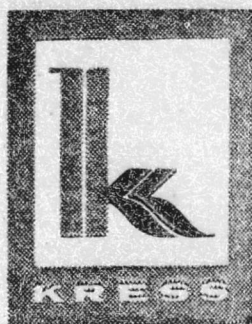

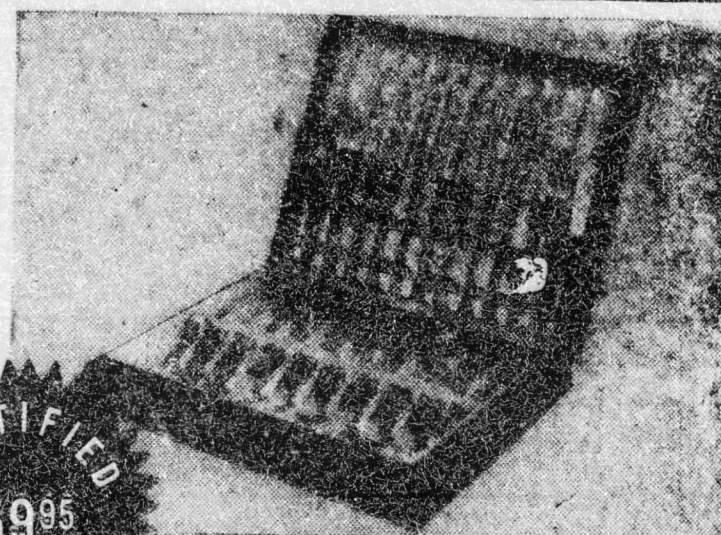

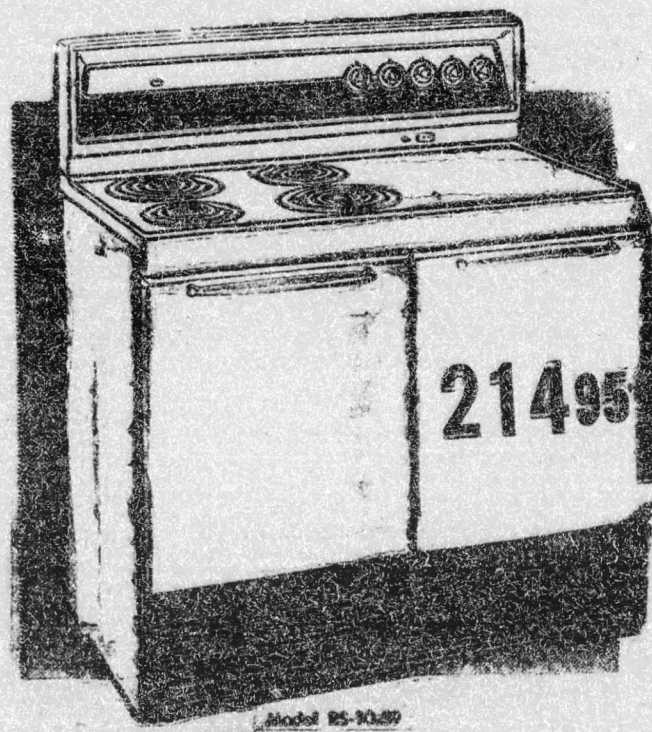
