## Rev. King Raps Government And Moslem Hate Groups

MILWAUKEE (ANP) - The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., during an address last week before the National Bar Association, criticized the federal government and "black supremacy."

King, the leader of the Montgomery (Ala.) bus boycott that achieved bus integration, told lawyers that despite a lack of integration initiative by the federal executive and legislative branches, Negroes "must not stoop to the low and primitive methods of some of our opponents."

The Rev. King cited the Negro Moslem movement, which originated in New York, as one of the "hate groups arising in our midst which would preach a doctrine of black supremacy."

Black supremacy is as bad as white supremacy, he continued.

Rapping the Republican administration, King said, "the executive branch of our government has been all too silent and apathetic, and the legislative branch has been all too stagnant and hypocritical."

Racial advances have been temporarily held back by a chief executive who refused to make a strong positive statement morally condemning segregation," he said.

Not confining his criticism to the Republican party, the minister added: "The cause of justice has been
