Vitamins in the sweet potato are not readily lost during boiling or baking. Sweet potatoes are rich in vitamin A and serve as an excellent source of energy due to high sugar and starch content.

SWEET POTATO BALLS Boil sweet potatoes in their skins until tender. Remove skins, wash and season with salt and butter. Form a ball with a marshmallow in the center. Roll in cereal flakes and place in oven to brown. The potato can be placed on a slice of pineapple for added flavor.
