The general theme for the occasion is "The Biblical and Theological Basis of Missions." The guest speaker will be Dr. John E. Skoglund, the Cornelius Woolfink professor of preaching at Colgate Rochester Divinity School.

A native of California, Dr. Skoglund received the A. B. degree at the University of California and the M. A. and B. D. degrees at the Berkeley Baptist Divinity School. He earned the Th. D. degree at Yale University. He is a member of several religious organizations on an international level.

As an author, he has written "Come and See," "I Believe," "The Spirit Tree" and "The Reach for Life," one of the two mission study texts for 1955-56 of the Missionary Education Movement.
