

# Charlie Winters, 92, Dies At Home Here

Mr. Charlie Winters of 225 South East St. died at his home October 27, at the age of 92. Mr. Winters was married to the former Lillie Summerville and fathered 12 children. His offerings now include 16 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.

He had resided at the same address all his life. He operated one of the first Negro-owned automotive garages in the city and was a press boy for the News and Observer. Mr. Winters was affiliated with the Widow's Son Lodge of Freemasons, Odd Fellows Lodge, and Saint Ambrose Episcopal Church. Funeral arrangements will be held Friday afternoon from Saint Ambrose Church, the Rev. Joseph Green officiating.

Tommy Priakos, owner of the drive-in, has used Negro carhops for four years, without incident. He said the mob of '60 or '70' white men who appeared at his restaurant and demanded that the students be replaced with white girls, were probably upset because three Negro students recently tried to enter the nearby all-white Dollarway School. Priakos said that he did not plan to fire the youths, but would keep them on "suspension" for an indefinite period, until things cool down.
