Alexander, of Detroit, Imperial Potentate of the 15,000-member organization. The books, authored by prominent American authors, and organized in libraries of 99 books each, will be sent to Ghana, Ethiopia, Sudan, Liberia and Guinea.

They represent a presentday view of Americans and will include the late Booker T. Washington's biography, "Up From Slavery." A total of 25 of the 99-book libraries, or "bookshelves," were recommended to be bought by the Prince Hall Shriner's Imperial Council while in session in Los Angeles this year.
