### SPEECH CLINICIANS PARTICIPATE

Two Raleigh speech clinicians participated in a panel-demonstration on voice disorders at the 11th Conference on Friday at 3 p. m. in the Haynes-Barton Room of the Sir Walter Hotel.

They were: Herbert Ellis, speech therapist with the Raleigh public schools, and Marcus H. Boulware, professor of speech correction at St. Augustine's College.

The sectional meeting was devoted to "Demonstration of Voice Disorders: Diagnosis and Therapy."

Mr. Ellis was one of the three speech therapists who helped in interviewing six children who were suspected of having vocal disorders. One of the techniques employed was to present "Jocko," a type of picture card used to get children to pronounce words.

Other speech therapists were Mrs. Bruce Gray of Raleigh and Mrs. Harold Eskridge of Garner.

Dr. Boulware served as a consultant along with Dr. Bernard Jackson, assistant professor of speech and hearing, East Carolina College, Greenville; Mrs. Jean H. Boren, assistant professor of speech therapy, Greensboro College, Greensboro; and Dr. Herbert Koepff — Baker, director of speech and hearing, Asheville Orthopedic Hospital, Asheville.

## Yes, We All Talk

### THE AMENDMENT

Too many clubs make errors in disposing of amendments. For example, when the club passes the amendment, the chairman states that the main motion is carried, in the wording of the main motion. This is not true, because the amendment merely makes a change. Hence, a club should vote upon the motion as amended. The procedure involves disposing of two motions—the amendment to the main motion and the main motion as amended.

This is the procedure that should be taken:

1. First, discuss and vote upon the amendment to the main motion.

2. Second, discuss and vote upon the main motion as amended.

Suppose that the club had before the house: a main motion, an amendment to the main motion, and an amendment to the amendment.

There would be three motions before the house, and they should be voted upon in this order:

1. First, discuss and vote upon the amendment to the amendment;

2. Second, discuss and vote upon the amendment to the main motion;

3. Third, discuss and vote upon main motion as amended.

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## Shriners Are Seeking 60,000 New U. S. Voters

LOS ANGELES—An all-out effort toward increased political participation by Negroes in the United States will begin Sunday, Nov. 22, as the 15,000-member organization of Prince Hall Shriners launch a national drive to help register the more than four million unregistered Negroes in the U. S.

The week-long campaign will end Nov. 28, with each Negro Shiner among the 150 Temples in 37 states expected to be personally responsible for having obtained four new voters in his particular voting area.

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## Prince Hall Shriners Send Books To African Nations

LOS ANGELES — Prince Hall Shriners will soon send 2,500 books to African Nations as part of Pres. Eisenhower's "People to People" program. It was disclosed this week by Booker T. Alexander, of Detroit, Imperial Potentate of the 15,000-member organization. The books, authored by prominent American authors, and organized in libraries of 99 books each, will be sent to Ghana, Ethiopia, Sudan, Liberia and Guinea.

They represent a present-day view of Americans and will include the late Booker T. Washington's biography, "Up From Slavery." A total of 25 of the 99-book libraries, or "bookshelves," were recommended to be bought by the Prince Hall Shiner's Imperial Council while in session in Los Angeles this year.
