DYSPHONIA
 The term "dysphonia" is used to designate a partial loss of voice, or some vocal disturbance.
 The typical or normal speaking voice has the following characteristics:

1. Adequate loudness.
 Voices lacking loudness are described as thin, weak, or asthenic.

2. Clearness of tone.
 Voices lacking this quality are said to be hoarse, throaty, husky, or strident.

3. A pitch appropriate to the age and sex.
 Voices lacking this quality are termed high, shrill, eunuchoid, or treble.

4. A slight vibrato.
 Voices lacking this quality are said to be hard, metallic, or flat; voices displaying too much of this quality are tremulous and palsied.

5. A graceful and constant inflection of pitch and force in keeping with the meaning of what is said.
 Voices lacking this characteristic show exaggerated or monotonous tone.

Grant From Methodists Is Received

GREENSBORO—Miss Vivian P. Kirven, of Darlington, S. C., a freshman at Bennett College, was notified this week that she has been awarded a scholarship by the Board of Education of the Methodist Church.

The daughter of Mrs. Sadie Kirven, the recipient was valedictorian of the 1959 graduating class of Mayo High School in her native city. She is a chemistry major with a minor in mathematics.

The award, sixth to be granted to a Bennett College student for the 1959-1960 academic year, covers tuition and fees up to \$500 and is based upon "superior academic standing, leadership ability, active churchmanship, character, personality and need."
