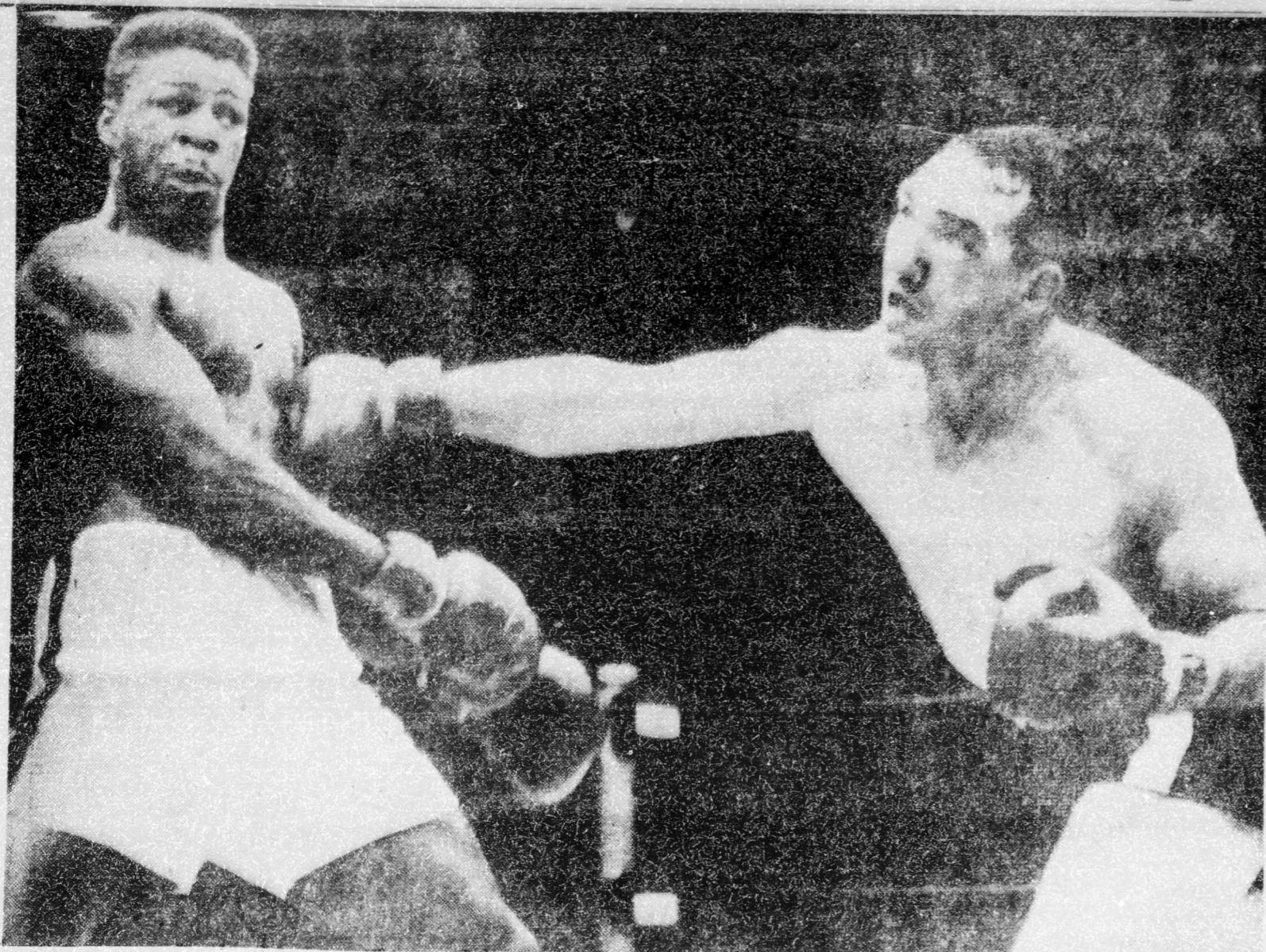


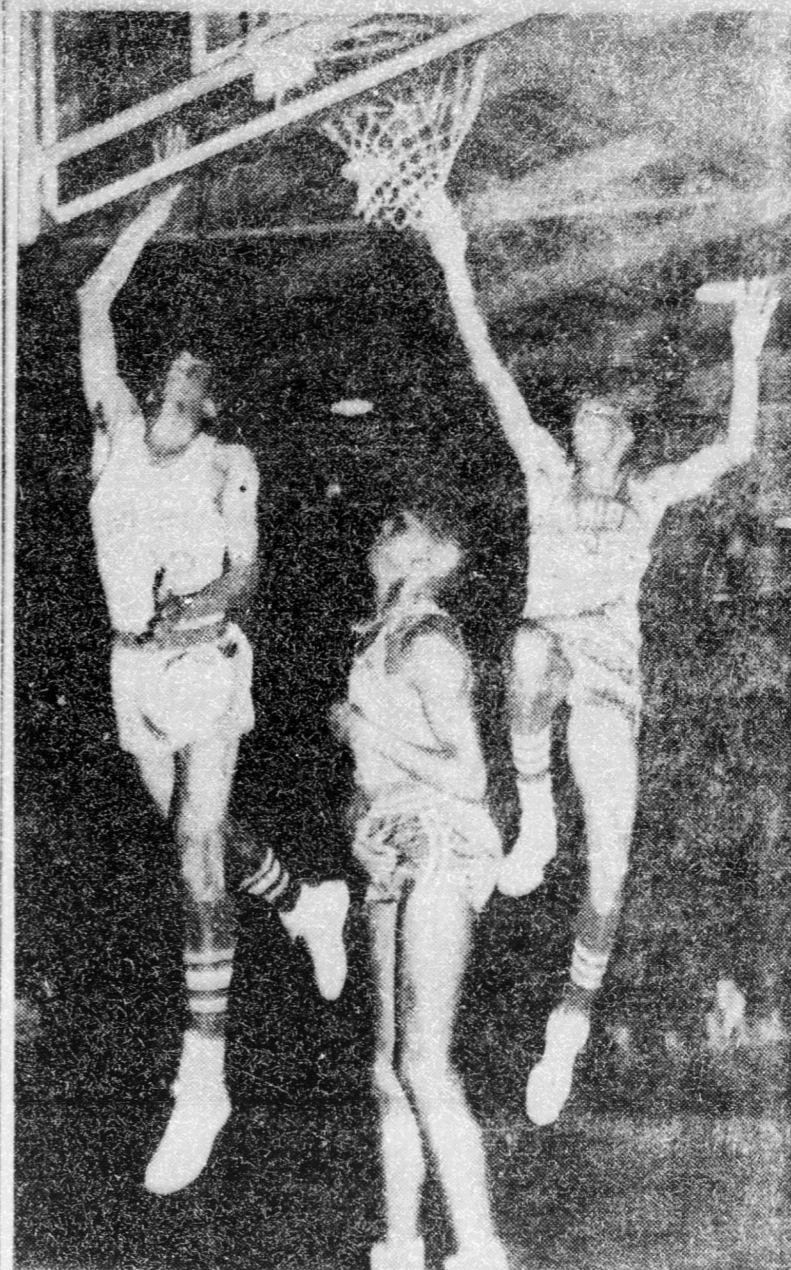
# Globetrotters Frolic In Capital City

## Two Dead, One Hurt In Battle

VICKSBURG, Miss.—(AP)—Two men lay dead and a third wounded after a blazing 35-minute gun battle here Sunday. Dead were Will Davis, 60-year-old Negro, who shot it out with a dozen peace officers who surrounded his home after he shot and killed Ulmer Griffith, 40 white.

### CAUSE OF DISPUTE A MYSTERY

Cause of the dispute that led Davis to kill Griffith was a mystery to police. They said they hoped that Mrs. Griffith who was with her husband when he met his death would be able to enlighten them when she recovered from shock. Police claim that Davis also shot at Mrs. Griffith but missed. Police Chief Murray Sills said the shooting started when Griffith and his wife went to the Davis home to inquire about some matter that Davis had stacked in his yard. When Griffith knocked, Sills said, Davis opened the door and fired on Griffith killing him instantly.

### POLICE USE TEAR GAS

Police then surrounded the house and called upon Davis to surrender. He responded, Sills said, by opening fire on them with a 12-gauge shotgun. Police then poured volley after volley into the house and finally used tear gas. When they entered the house they found Davis dead of wounds inflicted by the officers.

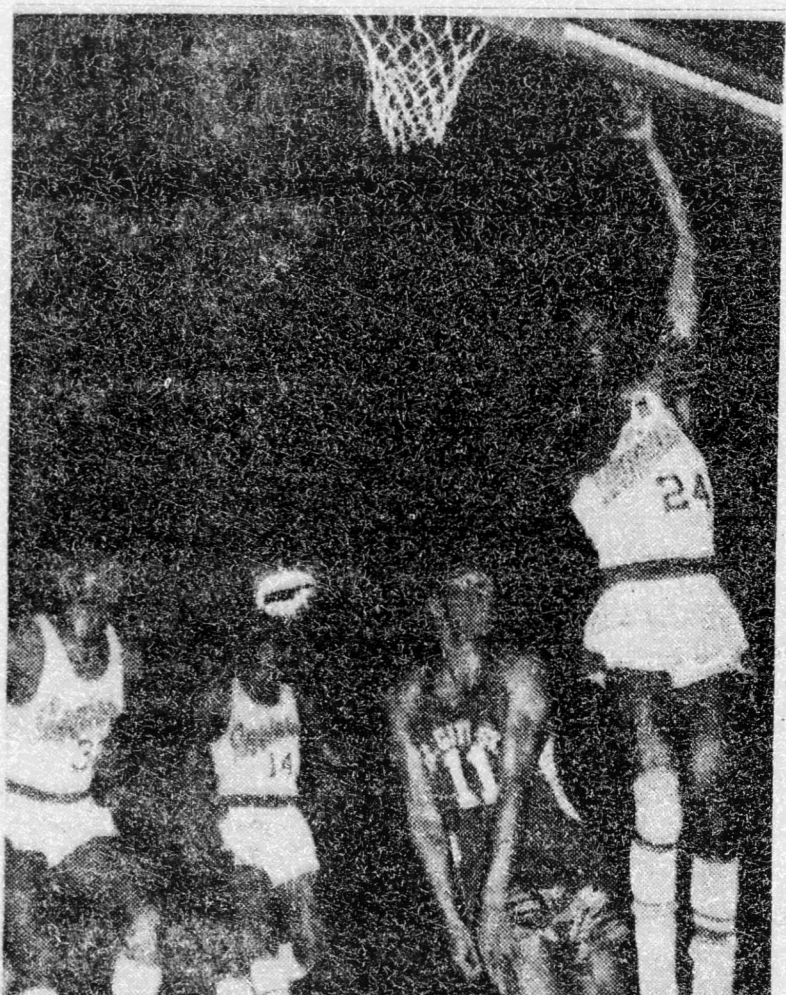
