

walked into police headquarters surrendered. here last Sunday morning and confessed that he slew Officer John R. Annas during a street brawl the previous night.

Faust, who was involved in street fight with another Negro, snatched a pistol from the holster of Officer James Bruce, who accompanied Annas, and pumped six bullets into Annas.

Bruce said he and Annas were riding in a patrol car in a Negro section when they spotted two Negroes engaged in a street fight with a large crowd of bystanders watchcing. He said the Negroes resisted

arrest. "A Negro man grabbed my pistel from the holster. He opened fire on Annas as Annas came back from the car. Annas fell to the street and the man with the gun pumped another five bullets into him as he lay there on the pavement.

Annas was rushed to Memorial Hospital by other officers answering the radio call. Annas was dead on arrival.


