### Shirley Chisholm Bringing Campaign To Raleigh Mon.

Mrs. Shirley Chisholm, the first black woman candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, will bring her campaign to North Carolina Monday and Tuesday with several appearances scheduled in the Tarheel state over the two-day period.

The announcement of her schedule in North Carolina was made jointly this week by Mrs. Chisholm's national press aide, Miss Liz Cohen and Wayne Parks, and one of her state co-ordinators, Mrs. Virginia K. Nevell of Winston-Salem.

The representative from the 15th Congressional New York District will arrive at the Raleigh-Durham Airport Monday morning at 9 o'clock. A large delegation consisting of her supporters throughout the state is expected to be on hand to greet Mrs. Chisholm.

Mrs. Chisholm will speak Monday morning at 10 o'clock at Meredith College's Jones Auditorium as part of the college's three-day "Urban Life and the Political Process." Her topic will be "Urban Life and the National Congress." Persons attending the session will get a chance to meet the

(Editor's Note: Following are statements made Tuesday by Dr. Reginald A. Hawkins, Charlotte dentist, who is making his second bid to become governor of N. C.)

One critical issue currently confronting public officials, mental health and about resources for those in need of assistance is that of the nature and status of mental health personnel, facilities, and other resources in both the private and public domain.
