Mrs. Chisolm Impresses Voters In Capital City

Mrs. Shirley Chisolm brought her presidential campaign to North Carolina this week making stops in three Tar Heel cities. The first black woman candidate made her first stop in Raleigh Monday, speaking at Meridith College, St. Augustine's College and Shaw University before moving on to Greensboro and Charlotte.

Speaking at Meridith Monday morning, Mrs. Chisolm told more than 1,900 that she had a dream. "I dream of an America in which an economic system of rights guarantees that the power of the dollar will be used to assure social justice for all our people. I dream of an America in which our national economy is known not for the private interests it serves but for the public and human needs it relieves. I dream of an America whose economy guarantees to every American a real job at an honest wage, instead of a guaranteed wage for a make-work job. I dream of the day when we will have a president who comes to the congress with a budget based on real full employment instead of the myth of full employment," she stated.

JACKSON, Miss. - Delegates to the 20th annual meeting of the Southeast Regional Convention, held at the Heidelberg Hotel, March 16-18, took all persons to task, who oppose the busing orders of the courts, in a caustic policy statement, at its closing session. The attack ranged from a stinging attack on what they deemed the vacillating approach by President Nixon, in his national pronouncement the night of March 16. In a strongly worded telegram they charged the chief executive with an attempt to play politics with the lives of children and that such action, as recommended by him, tended to weaken the last bastion of justice--the United States Supreme Court.
