This is the third (AND LAST) in a series of stories relating to the shooting of William Nathaniel Vinson, 43, 314 Bloodworth Street, by Bobby Rayford Dew, 37-year-old resident of 313 S. Bloodworth Street, who came into The CAROLINIAN last Tuesday evening and admitted he shot and killed Bobby Dew in the right cheek with a .32 calibre pistol on Sunday, September 15, between 9:30 and 10:30 a.m.
Since Mr. Vinson had been interviewed previously and Mr. Dew's story appeared in our September 28th issue, the following is what Vinson had to say about the situation.
"Since he (Dew) told me he was going to help me, now let me tell you how I feel about it."
On Sunday, September 15, at about 9 o'clock in the morning, Bobby Dew came to my home and started talking to Lizzie Bridges. I saw W. VINSON, P. 2.

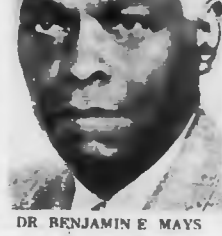

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Rev. Jesse Louis Jackson, founder and president of Operation PUSH (People United to Save Humanity), will receive the Presidential Citation of the American Public Health Association, during its 62nd annual meeting in New Orleans Oct. 7.

Victim Is Kicked By Policemen

Five Cleveland Heights, Ohio policemen were indicted last week by a federal grand jury on charges of beating and kicking a prisoner in a jail cell.
Attorney General William B. Saxbe said the indictment was returned in U.S. District Court in Cleveland, Ohio, against Detectives Edward C. Smith, Roland A. Salcer, Joseph M. Sas, Peter J. Previte, and Robert O. Kral.
The indictment said the five violated the constitutional right of Sherman D. Howard, 26, of the Cleveland area, not to be deprived of liberty without due process of law.
Howard was allegedly kicked and beaten in the Geauga County Safety Center in Chardon, Ohio, near Cleveland on Aug. 22, 1972, after he had been taken into custody on a narcotics charge.
Howard, who is black, was taken to a hospital for treatment. The five detectives are white.
Howard is now confined to the London, Ohio, correctional facility for possession of narcotics and escape.
Assistant Attorney General J. Stanley Pottinger, head of the Civil Rights Division, said the maximum penalty upon conviction is a year in prison and a \$1,000 fine.

BOSTON — Mayor Kevin H. White has been named a co-defendant in the Boston busing desegregation case with the Boston School Board whose members have been his principal political opponents.

U.S. District Judge W. Arthur Jones said he was naming the mayor a co-defendant because of the city's resistance to desegregation. The city is accused of "deliberate and conscious" defiance of the federal court's orders.

Arthur Lee Moore, 40, Washington Street, New York, was found lying on the floor at 520 E. Hargett Street when Officer T. H. V. arrived on the scene at 10:30 p.m. Sunday. "He made a statement about who shot him to the officer. The man bleeding heavily from gunshot wounds." Arrested at the scene of the crime was George Leamon Bridges, 37, of the Hargett Street address.
