said Mark Bernstein. As the individual most responsible for writing the Agreement, Mark's comment carries considerable authority. "It's very hard being out in brand new territory," continued Bernstein, "but it isn't lonely. The individual members of the different executive committees are right there with me, working to break historic ground."

The first 36 pages of the Agreement received their initial review at the Wildacres retreat, Labor Day Weekend. In work sessions lasting over 4½ hours, the document was revised, sharpened and amended. The reworked format was submitted to the executive committees where much the same process has continued.

"Of course we are concerned about how the document affects us," said a member of one of the committees, "but we are just as concerned to make sure that everyone else gets equal treatment. Between us we will find and correct all the problems."

Each executive committee's revised version will be brought to a Presidents' Council meeting for comparison and finalization. This completed Agreement will then be voted on by the Board of Directors. Finally, the memberships will cast their votes.

"If the process seems long," said Bernstein, "it is and yet it isn't. It is long because there is too much at stake here to hurry. We have been at this, working together, making history between institutions for over two years. It isn't long because the final form of the Agreement will be ready within the next few months."

Herman Blumenthal, President of the Foundation, pointed out, "The Joint Venture Agreement is an important part of the Project, but it isn't the only part, and we have a great deal of progress going on in raising the necessary funds, in public relations, and in work for the Building Committee and the Track II Committee.

"We are proceeding right on schedule and we expect to live up to our slogan, 'In The Door by '84'."
