#### Israel is IN Epcot

Israel is definitely in Epcot at Walt Disney World in Orlando, Florida. Israeli art, pictures, food, clothes, flags, sodas and people make up the New Millennium Village Showcase. The new Millennium Village is truly a showcase in itself located between Canada and the United Kingdom.
