For the first year ever, Camp SOAR and the LJCC were featured for over two hours in various segments of "Wilson's World" on Fox News Rising. Our own Barry Schumer played a cameo.

Although the campers are young and old, all the various dis-

abilities did not stop them from participating in Camp SOAR. If you could experience what all the volunteers and steering committee experienced during these five days, you would have been amazed. The campers improved in their physical fitness, motor skills, self-confidence and campers and volunteers alike enjoyed
