Experience the Ten Commandments at Ohr HaTorah

A fantastic experience will be happening on Wednesday, May 15, at Ohr HaTorah. It is the holiday of Shavuot when we relive the monumental event that changed the Jewish landscape forever - the giving of the Torah at Mt. Sinai. The Sanctuary at Ohr HaTorah will be transformed into a spectacular setting which will replicate the scenery from the original Mt. Sinai, where the Israelites received the Torah from God, 3,325 years ago.

All children attending this event will be invited as the guests of honor. They will march in to the sanctuary and be positioned in front of the Bimah as the Ten Commandments are read from the Torah scroll. Just like the first time Moshe proclaimed the children to be the guarantors of the Torah, so it is today, that the children guarantee the Torah will be studied and observed.

The Ten Commandments event begins at 11AM at Ohr HaTorah, 6619 Sardis Road in Charlotte. A delicious dairy feast awaits all guests and there will be an exciting ice cream party for the children. This event is open to the entire Jewish community.

The festival of Shavuot is mostly recognized for its delicious dairy foods such as blintzes and cheesecake. The reason for

this is that on Shavuot the people of Israel received the Torah. One of the first commitments the Jews made to God upon entering this special covenant was to observe the Kosher laws. They were not yet familiar with Kashrut and only ate dairy until they were proficient in their new life style. Thus, it has been a tradition for thousands of years for Jews to feast on dairy foods during the festival of Shavuot in commemoration of this mitzvah.

Another Shavuot tradition is to study the Torah all night long on the first evening of Shavuot. According to the Midrash, the Jewish people slept such a peaceful sleep on the morning when the Torah was to be given that they had to be awakened by God. To make up for this relaxed attitude to this great gift from God, we study the entire night preceding the reading of the Ten Commandments on Shavuot. Many people read the book Tikkun Leil Shavuot, which contains selections from both the Written and Oral Torah. Ohr HaTorah will conduct Torah study classes throughout the night starting at midnight.
