As the day wore on I heard several stories of other people having similar experiences throughout the park.

After a nod and a smile an attractive young man was approached by another the single gay man looking for the possibility of a new encounter or a potential relationship. Upon striking up a conversation the initiator rattled off the usual rhetoric: "You don't have to be this way. God loves you."

A younger lesbian I met recalled her conversation with a group of the youth as she entered the park. "They wanted me to listen to what they had to say but they certainly weren't interested in anything I had to say back."

Eventually police began ejecting the harassers and limiting them to the sidewalk area outside the park bordering Third St. — at one point more than 20 had been forcibly removed. The group with the booth, it turned out, weren't who they said they were. They had broken down their booth and left - but not before it was determined that they were part of Operation Save America. Near afternoon's

end, individuals from the undercover OSA booth, the numerous stealth invader youths and a few dark suited men had regrouped on a hill overlooking the stage. Barred from re-entering the park, they simply stood by a giant cross and occasionally engaged passersby in politely confrontational conversation.

On a more pleasant note, Charlotte Pride was a huge success — with the largest attendance ever to date. And don't get me wrong - even though I've devoted a lot of space to my thoughts about anti-gay efforts that took place during the event, there was so much that was beautiful and fantastic: the overthe-top costuming worn by the performing drag queens and live musical performances by Mark Weigle and Sister Funk and the shared camaraderie by all the queers in attendance, no matter what their back-
