Navy as the "Mariner" lying boat patrol bomber, known to the O.S. Nary as the PBM-3. Designed for long-range operations, it is equipped to stay away from its base for protracted periods. It has gull-shaped wings, toed-in twin rudders and a sharp dihedral on tail planes, and is powered by two Wright aircooled engines. The "Mariner" is heavily armed—having guns on top, on both sides, in the nose and on the underside of the rear hull. It can he used for convoy duty or to scout far ahead of surface fleet operations.


# **Helldivers Hold Top Spot In Squad Sports Program**


