'Buster Quintet Tackles Norfolk Today at 1400

Norfolk's Naval Air Station quintet, one of the top service basketball teams in the South, will arrive in Chapel Hill this morning to engage the Cloudbusters this afternoon at 1400 in Woollen gym. The game is the first of three to be played by the local club during the next six days, Catawba College coming here on Wednesday and the highly touted Penn State club on Friday.

Not to be confused with the Norfolk Naval Training Station club is the team playing here this afternoon, although it might be well to add there is little difference in the calibre of the two clubs. The Naval Training Station outfit holds two victories over the Naval Air Station quintet, both of which were overtime tilts. The team playing here has defeated, among others, the strong Appalachian State Teachers College club which defeated the Cloudbusters earlier in the year, 53 to 46.

Outstanding for the visitors are Robert Carpenter, six foot, four inch center; Bennie Cunningham and Al Schrik, forwards; and Eddie Shokes and William Anderson, guards

Carpenter made the all-conference team at East Texas for three years, and played professional basketball with Oshkosh (Wis.) All-Stars. He was an all-tournament selection in the world professional basketball tournament two years ago.

Starting for the Cloudbusters will be the usual quintet of Kraft and Caldwell at the forwards, Jones at center, and Hughes and Mott at the guards.

The only game played by the Cloudbusters this past week was against VPI on Monday afternoon. They lost, 44 to 40. Tied 23-23 at halftime, the locals opened the second half strong only to see the visitors tie up the ball game, and then go ahead to win. Paul Caldwell, forward, was high scorer for both teams with 16 points. Captain Jack Kraft played his usual fine defensive game besides scoring eight points.
