
37 New V-5 Instructors Assigned to Chapel Hill

New recognition to the wartime value of lighter-than-air craft was given by the Navy Department last week with the formation of a separate Training Command for airship personnel. It is the first Training Command for the airship branch and emphasizes the importance of lighter - than - air craft in the U.S. Navy air program.

First Chief of Naval Airship Training is Capt. Charles E. Rosendahl, USN, a veteran of 20 years lighter - than - air experience, who has been nominated by the President for promotion to the rank of Rear Admiral. All airship training is now combined under his direction as a single functional unit.
