Japanese Sea Power

Although the Japanese possess sea power in considerable strength, their naval history is quite unlike that of the western nations. Recent studies by Alexander Kiralfy which have appeared in Foreign Affairs and in Makers of Modern Strategy (Princeton Univ. Press, 1943) have revised our naval analysts' prophecies of great sea battles for the control of the Pacific. Kiralfy maintains that the Japanese have no doctrine comparable to Mahan's "battle fleet supremacy" idea, and that their fleet will never fight for mas-
