
(Continued from page three) the same course. Previous students of Togo's strategy have been misled by his stirring battle signals which made him appear to be an aggressive leader. Yet Togo himself went on record as saying, "In a battle the most important thing is caution." Even in his great victory at Tsushima Admiral Togo had no intention of destroying the Russian fleet. His tactics during the battle give no hint of any plan to secure a decisive victory by pressing home the Japanese advantage in ships and guns. Like his predecessors Togo was mindful of the navy's obligation to protect troop movements. Indeed, the official Japanese history of the Russo-Japanese War emphasizes the fact that naval forces were employed primarily in support of the army's plan of operations.

At the outbreak of war in 1914 the Japanese again put their basic naval policy into effect. Enough troops were conveyed to China to crush the German Asiatic bases but the Imperial navy allowed Graf von Spee's squadron to escape across the Pacific.

If the Japanese are reluctant to use their sea power in a vigorous naval offensive to secure command of the sea, how can the raids on Port Arthur in 1904 and on Pearl Harbor in 1941 be explained? Both of these operations, conducted under conditions of minimum risk before the outbreak of war, secured a temporary advantage for the movements of the Japanese army. By immobilizing the Russian fleet at Port Arthur the Japanese were able to transport enough troops to insure the capture of that base from the land. Pearl Harbor won a temporary respite that permitted unhindered amphibious operations in the East Indies.
