Red Cross 1944 War Fund

GIVE SO THAT OTHERS MAY LIVE—

With this plea, the American Red Cross on March 1 began its nationwide campaign for contributions to its 1944 War Fund.

A national campaign goal of \$200,000,000 has been established as required for operations of the Red Cross for the year from Mar. 1, 1944, to Feb. 28, 1945.

Approximately 90% of the \$200,000,000 will be devoted to activities directly related with, or a necessary part of, Red Cross service and assistance to the armed forces.

Familiar to everyone are the manifold war services of the Red Cross which form a vital link between the American fighting man and the folks at home.

\$25 pays the monthly cost of a Red Cross Arts and Skills unit in a military hospital in the U. S.

\$100 provides a sufficient number of Red Cross recreation workers in hospitals overseas to cheer and comfort 7,000 sick and wounded men for a day.

\$100 pays for Red Cross medical First Aid kits for American prisoners of war in enemy hands, to meet the emergency needs of 1,250 men for a month.

Five places on this station have been designated to receive contributions from Pre-Flight personnel.

These are: (1) Welfare and Recreation Office, Alexander Hall (Chaplain Grewenow); (2) Reception Desk, Navy Hall (Miss Baur); (3) Room 103, Murphey (Miss Bayer); (4) Athletic Office, Woollen gymnasium (Mrs. Schnibben); and (5) Naval Dispensary (Mr. Lynch).

All Pre-Flight officers are urged to make their contributions to the Red Cross War Fund at one of these places, before the campaign ends here on March 10. The Regiment of Cadets and members of the Crew are invited to lend their support to the drive also.
