

Navy to Decrease Output of V-12 Pilot Candidates

In keeping with the currently diminishing need for Naval aviators and the consequent cutback in Naval aviation training announced last June by the Navy Department, the Bureau of Naval Personnel has completed plans for a downward revision in the pilot candidate output in the V-12 program.

The revised training schedule, it was announced last week, will affect 18,000 officer candidates who enrolled in V-12 between Nov. 1, 1943, and July 1, 1944, for preliminary study leading to Naval pilot training.

The number of pre-aviation students who will eventually enter flight training after completion of V-12 pre-aviation training will be reduced from 18,000 to approximately 9,000. Those pre-aviation students not selected for flight training will remain in V-12 for additional training leading to commissions as deck, engineering, and specialist officers.

Bray, who hails from Western Michigan, tips the scales at 231.

Reports from Navy indicate Commander Oscar Hagberg, Navy's head coach, will count heavily on the passing experience of his 1943 star, Hal Hamberg, but that on the basis of practice during the past week the man who appears to be the likely "spark plug" of the squad is Bob Jenkins, who scored against Army last season.

One change in Coach Hagberg's plans was noted with the disclosure that he planned to use Al Walton, of Pasadena, Calif., to handle conversions after touchdowns. Vic Finos was the heavy duty man in this department last season and was expected to fill the same post again this year. Walton is a 6 foot 1 inch, 178-pound charging back who showed up as a potential broken-field runner in last Saturday's scrimmages against the plebes and junior varsity.

Navy will depend largely on grade-A reserves, three or four deep in the backfield, but Coach Hagberg said he looked forward

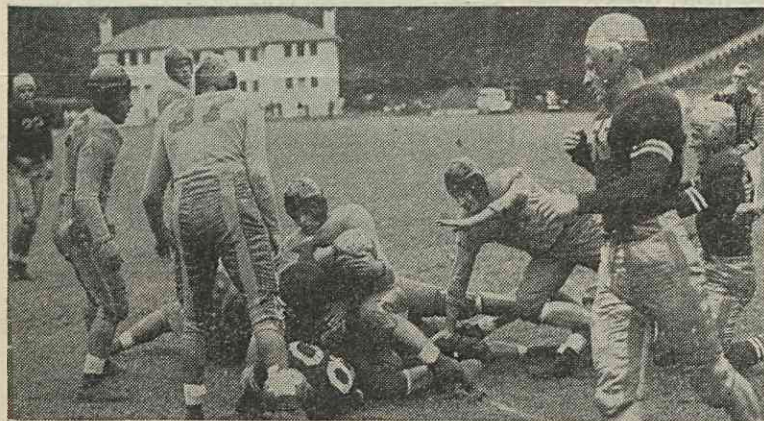
