

Commander Kane Guest of Honor At Sports Dinner

Comdr. William R. (Killer) Kane, USN, head of physical and military training for naval aviation, under the Director of the Aviation Training Division, Office of Chief of Naval Operations, was guest of honor at a dinner last week in the Pine Room of Lenoir Hall attended by athletic directors and coaches from nearby colleges, Carolina sportswriters and radio announcers, and naval officers.

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partment, on application, for enlisted personnel 42 years old and older in the following categories:

Inducted personnel (USN-I) and members of the Naval Reserve and Fleet Reserve. Exceptions will be Regular Navy personnel and men undergoing hospitalization or in a disciplinary status.

It is expected that three months will be required to accomplish progressive release of U. S. shore-based personnel, while for personnel afloat or abroad it is expected that release and return will require six months.

In addition, enlisted personnel who have previously been classified as fit for limited duty only by reason of a medical survey will be physically re-examined over the period of the next four months and, if found unfit for general duty, will be discharged or released. Exceptions will include men who have been partially disabled in combat areas but who desire to remain in the Navy, and men who meet the physical standards for induction as special assignment personnel.

He was among a group of officers sent on a survey trip to each of the schools for the purpose of foreseeing problems expected to arise where a Naval unit is superimposed on the campus of a peacetime university. The original curriculum followed by the Pre-Flight schools reflected in some measure his experiences at Ohio State, for he assisted in outlining several of the courses taught.

Lt. Comdr. Hamilton reported to Chapel Hill on May 24, 1942, as head of the Academic Department. He served in that role until April, 1944, when he became Executive Officer.

Lt. Comdr. Hamilton was graduated from Ohio State in 1924, was admitted to the bar in 1928, and held the position of executive secretary of the College of Arts and Sciences when he entered the Navy.

The new Executive Officer, Lt. Comdr. Loader, is another veteran in the Navy's V-5 program and at one time headed the Essentials of Naval Service course taught at Chapel Hill.

Lt. Comdr. Loader attended New York University and was graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy with the class of 1926. He was commissioned an ensign and served on the *USS Arkansas* for three years before resigning to enter civilian business. He was assistant general manager at L. Bamberger & Co., Newark, N. J., when he returned to the Navy in March, 1942, as a lieutenant in the Naval Reserve.

He was ordered to duty as Pre-Flight Section Liaison Officer for the Bureau of Aeronautics and the Bureau of Personnel regarding the procurement of V-5 instructors. In June, 1942, he was head of the ENS course at the Navy Pre-Flight School, Chapel Hill. From January, 1943, until December, 1943, he served as academic director at the Navy Pre-Flight School, Del Monte, Cal., and supervised and administered all ground training. He reported for duty at the Naval Air Primary Training Command headquarters in January, 1944.
