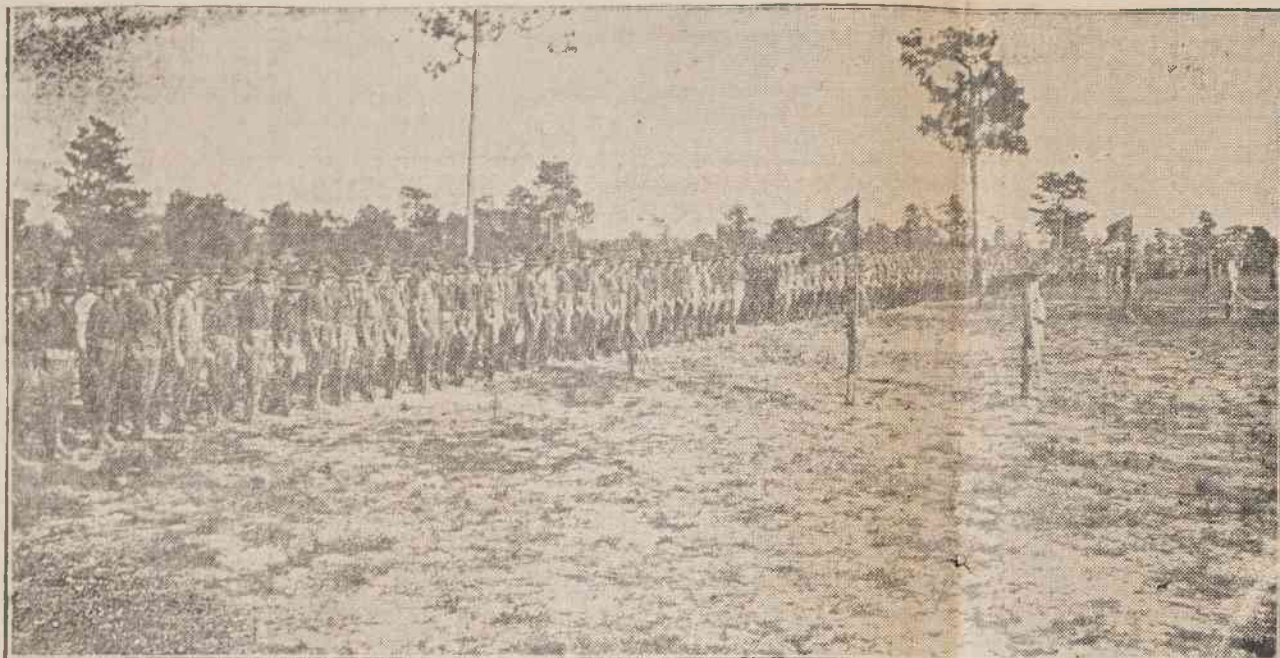


Regimental Parade C. M. T. C. Fort Bragg After One Week's Training

This picture, taken at the regimental parade on Friday, June 19, 1931, shows the very creditable appearance made by the students after only one week of training. Out of the 827 members exactly 500 had never worn a uniform until a week before this picture was taken. The rifles were issued the day before the picture was made. Rev. and Mrs. H. E. Crutchfield went to Nashville, Va., Saturday morning where Mrs. Crutchfield will spend some time with her parents.

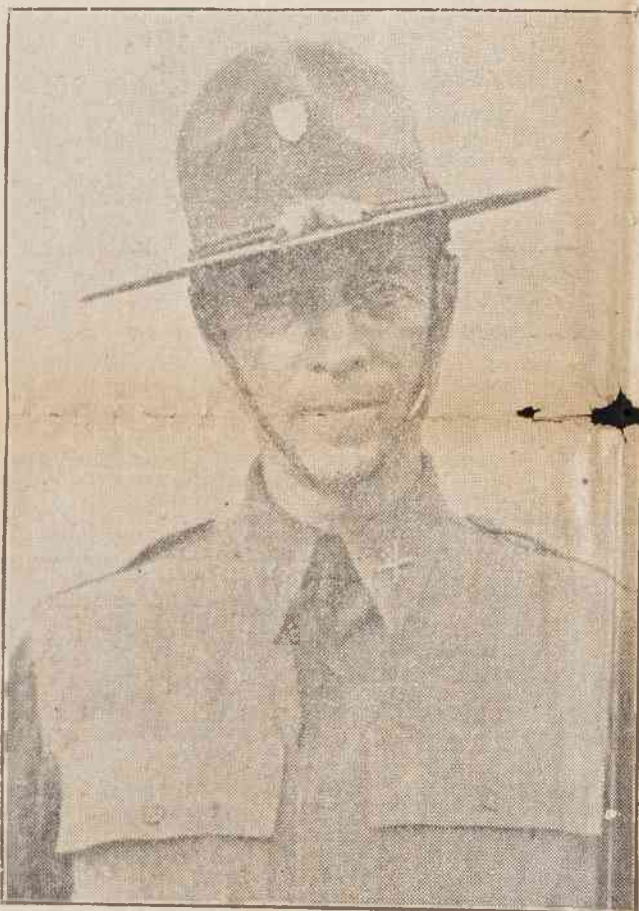
