The following is a letter received by Newton Neeley's sisters in Spindale. The family had heard nothing from him since receiving a wire from the war department, on March 10, that he had been missing since Feb. 17. The letter, which was not dated, said:

"I was captured on the 17th February in Tunisia. Since then I have been traveling most of the time. We flew over from Africa to Italy, stayed there about a week, and came on to Germany. We have been treated very well. I understand I can receive all the mail sent me, and as many cigarettes; but as to other things see the Red Cross and they can tell you how much and how often parcels can be sent. I want you to put in an order through the Red Cross to send me two cartons of cigarettes a month. I want you to send me through the Red Cross a light blanket, a pair of slippers, underwear, socks and handkerchiefs and anything else allowed you think I might want. I received the last letter from you the last of January."

The letter was signed, "Newt."
