C., has been awarded a fourth Oak Leaf Cluster to his Air Medal. Overseas seven menths, Sgt. Spurling has completed 35 missions with the 381st Bombardment Group to date. He won his gunners wings Feb. 7, 1944, at Kingman, Ariz.

The airman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Spurling, sr., and is married to the former Miss Myrtle Pritchard, of Spindale, N. C. His wife and two-year-old daughter, Shirley, now live with his parents.
