F-27 DELIVERY SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED BY FAIRCHILD

The delivery schedule for the Fairchild F-27 propiet transports, with West Coast Airlines receiving the first 40 passenger airliner in March 1958, has been announced. The delivery schedule is based on a firm production schedule which calls for the first F-27 to roll out of the Hagerstown facility in December of this year. The schedule is as follows: West Coast Airlines, 6 F-27's March through October 1958: Piedmont Airlines, 12 F-27's April through October 1958; Bonanza Airlines, 3 F-27's May through July 1958; other airlines receiving their F-27's with deliveries extending through 1959 are Quebecair 2; Avensa 5; Mackey 2; Northern Consolidated 3; Southwest Airways 3; AREA (Ecuador) 1; Wien-Alaska 3; and Wheeler Airlines 2.

In addition to the airline F-27's the executive version for corporations will be delivered starting in December 1958.
