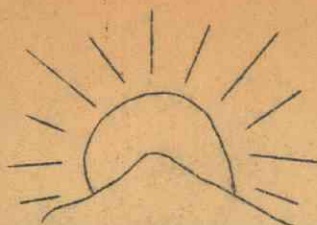

TOWER ADDED TO METHODIST CHURCH

A new landmark has been added in the town of Highlands. On Thursday of last week the top spire of the tower on the Highlands Methodist Church was hoisted into place by the Conway Construction Company of Greenville, S.C.

Plans for the graceful tower were drawn by Mr. Upton C. Ewing, architect, and George Cleveland, Fred Hopper, Leon Potts and Clyde Hopper were in charge of the construction. The tower blends with the exterior of the entire building, making it an outstanding example of modern colonial architecture.

The remaining work on the building consists of completing the memorial chapel, to be known as the Smith-Tillett Memorial Chapel. This work is scheduled to begin in the near future.

LIBRARY TEA

The Hudson Library Silver Tea, at the exquisitely beautiful home of Mrs. Harold Cooledge, on Tuesday was a delightful affair.
