In 1932, Miss Gilder spent her first summer in Highlands. She occupied other buildings with her grocery business before her final buy in 1937 of the recently sold building, but is continuing to reside in her cute, neat little apartment above the store.

Her own pet name of Sara Gilder's store was "old-fashioned." She expressed the reason for her windows always being full of very choice pot plants such as azaleas, geraniams, gardineas, fuschia, and many other colorful flowers, was for the sole enjoyment of "people's pleasure." Also, for added attractions for masculine friends she had "only very pretty girls" working in the store.

Being very active in Highlands' clubs and activities, Miss Gilder has been either chairman or vice-chairman of the Red Cross for a number of years, and has taught Sunday School in the Presbyterian Church in the Beginners' Department for fifteen years. She was one of the original Highlands Bridge Club members, a charter member of the Garden Club and is a trustee of the Highlands Community Hospital.

Before making her home in Highlands, Miss Gilder lived at Birmingham, Alabama where she worked for the U. S. Steel Corporation in the Welfare Department.
