EARLY DAYS OF THE HUDSON LIBRARY by Sarah Hines Bailey

"I'll loan a stove," said Professor Harbison. "It's cracked a little on one side. "I'll fix it" volunteered Mr. Boynton. "Well, I'll give a cord of wood" offered Mr. J. Jay Smith. From other sources came offers of a lamp, a table and the meager furnishings for the small room which housed the Hudson Library of 1894. At that time the library was composed of six shelves of books contained within an old fashioned closed bookcase.

The actual nucleus of the Library was a box of new books sent down from Massachusetts to start a library in memory of Mrs. Ella Hudson, who came to Highlands in 1880 to restore her health. She was a woman of unselfish spirit whose wish was "to place good reading matter within reach of the communities of this region." (Con't. page 9)
