## BREVARD MUSIC CENTER

The Brevard Music Center opened its 21st season June 23 with James Christain Pfohl directing the orchestra of the faculty and staff at Transylvania Music Camp, Winifred MacBride Thomas guest pianist.

This was the first concert in the summer festival of music in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains near Brevard, N. C. Four concerts will be presented each week through August 25, and Transylvania expects its finest season. Internationally-known artists and distinguished guest conductors will appear during the nine week period.

The Transylvania Concert Band, under the baton of Paul Bryan, will appear in concert Friday evening, June 28th. Saturday evening's program will feature Mary Spalding, harpist, with the orchestra of the faculty and staff conducted by James Christain Pfohl. Miss Spalding is harpist with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, and will play " Introduction and Allegro" by Ravel.

The brilliant young pianist Thomas Brockman will appear in concert Sunday afternoon, June 30th, with the Transylvania Symphony Orchestra, James Christian Pfohl conducting. Veteran of three European tours, Mr. Brockman has been heard in recital in the major music centers in England, Holland, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Italy, and the United States. The program will include Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 1.
