### ROLE OF "SISTER ANGELA" BRINGS DEBORAH KERR LUCK

Deborah Kerr, whose career in Hollywood since 1947, when she arrived from England an established star, has reached both the top and bottom of the ladder, considers her role in "Heaven Knows, Mr. Allison," coming soon to the Galax Theatre her good luck part. And, she says, 1956 was the best year in her life professionally. With three such pictures as "The King and I," "Tea and Sympathy" and her current Twentieth Century-Fox CinemaScope picture with Robert Mitchum as her co-star and John Huston as her director, she has become the most sought-after star in Hollywood today. She also won the 1956 Golden Apple Award by the Hollywood Women's Press Club as the most co-operative actress of the year.

Miss Kerr believes that her role as the nun in the Buddy Adler-Eugene Frenke production, presages good luck because the only time she played a nun previously was in "Black Narcissus," which paved the way for her being signed in Hollywood for American films.

"I feel this is a rare and tender story of a friendship of a woman dedicated to God and a man who, when he finally believes that fact, reacts with a sentimental and tender devotion. I love the role of Sister Angela for the delicacy with which it is developed, and most of all, for the humor which pervades it."

When Miss Kerr returned from the "Heaven Knows, Mr. Allison" location on the Island of Tobago, B.W.I., 6,000 miles from Hollywood, she found 30 scripts and plays awaiting her decision.
