"ADVENTURES IN ARCTIC ALASKA"

"Adventures in arctic Alaska" will be the subject of the illustrated lecture by Dr. David W. Johnston at the Museum of Natural History on August 2nd at 8:00 p.m.

The lecture will cover the plant communities, birds, mammals, general aspects of arctic biology, Eskimo villages, and crafts. The lecture will be the fourth in the regular Evening Lecture Series presented by the Highlands Biological Station.

Dr. Johnston is assistant professor of

biology at Wake Forest College. He holds the B. S. and M. S. degrees from the University of Georgia, and the Ph.D. degrees from the University of California. He has held fellowships from the Highlands Biological Station, the Southern Fellowship Fund, and the National Science Foundation. Dr. Johnston is an eminent ornithologist. His research studies have involved the physiology of birds, especially cardiac and fat metabolism. In addition to his work on birds, Dr. Johnston has done work on mammals.
