

Follow John Day Signs

W. T. Clearman, Jr., of Cocoa Beach, Fla. reported the incident by letter to U. S. Forest Service officials with the request that the area be adequately signed before some tragedy occurs.

Glenn Falls is a beautiful national forest scenic area located off the Dillard Road about five miles southwest of Highlands. The same rugged cliffs and tumbling waterfalls which provide the area's unique beauty also present a dangerous situation, especially for children unless accompanied by adults. Highland District Ranger Bob Padgett, recognizing the possible natural dangers of the waterfall area, erected new directional trail and warning signs throughout the area of Glenn Falls last October. "Mrs. Clearman's letter was the first notice that the signs had been vandalized", stated Padgett, "and we are immediately replacing the missing signs". This incident is an example that great personal danger is often caused by sign vandals as well as costing the taxpayer thousands of dollars each year. Responsible citizens should be on the lookout for vandals at work and promptly report these individuals to local authorities so they may be forced to pay for their feebleminded form of entertainment.
