 CONTRACT LET FOR NEW MACON COUNTY  
 COURTHOUSE

Franklin - Macon County Commissioners Monday night let a contract for \$1,151,728 for construction of a new Macon County Courthouse and Administration building, although a bond issue for the structure had been voted for only \$980,000.

Bids had been opened last Wednesday, but the lowest bid exceeded the bond issue.

However, Oscar Ledford, chairman of the County Board of Commissioners, called a meeting Monday night of community and governmental leaders and came up with a plan to finance the difference.

Bryant Construction Co. of Brevard won the contract, Ledford said Tuesday.

Planned is a modern two-story structure on the Franklin town square adjacent to the present courthouse, which has long been condemned by state officials.

Ledford said construction would begin in about three weeks and the job will be done in a year.
