
Come enjoy an evening of Christian fellowship over a meal, and then this enDR. SARGENT TO LECTURE

This week's lecture at the Museum of Natural History will be the final evening program of the season. The illustrated talk, "John and William Bartram, Early American Plant Explorers; with Special Attention to the Southern Appalachians", will be given by Dr. Ralph M. Sargent. Dr. Sargent, who has maintained a summer home in Highlands for . many years, is a noted botanist and has traced the route of William Bartram through the Blue Ridge, particularly here in Macon county.
