C. spirit. "Bob" Winfield kept his eye on four blondes, "Big Rock" Rodgers, A. C. strong man was frightened. We cannot figure it out, can you? "Bill" Cunningham, poor Bill, he was frustrated, and "Red" Amerson—Well we won't say, "Dopey" Allen said there were two many girls for him. The game ended with A. C. at the lower end of the score. This was K. C. T. C.'s first win of the season. Did A. C. boys get the horse laugh? We might say that A. C. C. has never won a basketball game from K. C. T. C. at Greenville. Do you wonder why???

### RESERVES DEFEATED BY WILSON HIGH

### Bulldogs Break Jinx By Defeating Indians

Cunningham led the scoring for A. C., scoring a dozen points. Dawson, his running mate, was next with nine. Wildermuth, Indian captain, led the Catawba attack scoring eight points.
