SECRETARY'S MESSAGE

This year we begin work with time left from a busy life, that of a teacher. Needless to say, it is with qualms that I take up the work, fearing that there will be many things needing attention that must go unattended, much needing to be done, in order to succeed.

I wish to thank all loyal alumni who gave generously of time and means last year that we might go forward to a greater extent than ever before. We need the support of all of you, that we may not stand still or go backward this year. With your help, I dare to look for greater things from the Association in the future than have been accomplished in the past.

Alumni Day last May was the same as Commencement Day. The luncheon at the Cherry Hotel was attended by nearly two hundred alumnus and friends of the College.

In the absence of President John A. Winfield, greetings and welcome to the Class of 1937 were extended by Dr. C. A. Jarman, vice-president of the Alumni Association. Miss Lou Ellen Petty, President of the Class made the response.

A brief resume of the past years work was made by the Secretary, Miss Eva Perkins. There was a general discussion then as to whether the Association should attempt to carry on the alumni work with a full-time secretary. It was voted to leave the decision with the steering committee. If they thought the necessary amount of money, \$1,200.00 for salary and approximately \$100.00 for traveling expenses could be raised, then full-time work would continue.

Dr. C. A. Jarman, financial secretary, made a report in which a deficit in funds to the amount of \$178.00 was reported. \$497.59 pledges had been collected, \$218.50 remained on the books in unpaid pledges.

The accounting committee consisting of Mr. C. B. Masburn, chairman, Miss Sadie Green, Messrs. J. M. Waters, Bruce Riley and Sam T. Freeman made the following report on officers for the coming year which was accepted by the Association:

President, John A. Winfield, Winfield.

Vice-president, C. A. Jarman, Atlantic Christian College.

Treasurer, Bruce Riley, Wilson.

Financial Secretary, C. A. Jarman.

The steering committee having conferred, felt that it would be difficult to maintain full time work in the Alumni Association and having the opportunity of retaining the same secretary for part time work, the latter course was voted upon by the committee.

The constitution was adopted as it now stands by the vote of the Association.

THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION OF ATLANTIC CHRISTIAN COLLEGE

CONSTITUTION

Article I—Name

This organization shall be called the Alumni Association of Atlantic Christian College.

Article II—Purposes

The purposes for which the organization is formed are to aid, strengthen, and expand in every proper and useful way Atlantic Christian College and its work; and to develop, strengthen, sympathize, and affectionate existing between the College and its Alumni, and among the Alumni themselves.

Article III—Membership

Any student who has attended Atlantic Christian College for one year is a member of the Alumni Association.

All members of the Faculty of Atlantic Christian College shall be entitled to honorary membership.

Article IV—Officers and Elections

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be president, vice-president, executive secretary, treasurer and financial secretary.

Section 2. A nominating committee for selecting nominees for offices shall be appointed by the president.

Section 3. The election of officers except the executive secretary, shall be held at each annual meeting.

Section 4. The executive secretary shall be chosen by the steering committee and shall hold office at their discretion.

Article V—Meetings

Section 1. The principal officer of the Association shall be at Wilson, N. C.

Section 2. The local chapters shall have the right to establish local offices as they find need in connection with their chapters.

Article VI—Committees

Section 1. The committees of the Association shall be the Finance committee and the steering committee.

Section 2. The steering committee shall consist of the president, vice-president, treasurer, financial secretary, chairman of each local unit, and five members to be nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the Association.

Article VII—Meetings

Section 1. The regular business meetings of the Association shall be held annually at Homecoming Day and during commencement week such time and place as the steering committee may designate.

Section 2. The steering committee shall hold meetings whenever needed, the time and place to be designated by the president.

Section 3. The president may call a special meeting of the steering committee at any time he thinks necessary, by due notice to the members.

Article VIII—Mutual Fund

Section 1. There shall be no set dues for membership. Each former student is a member of the Association.

Section 2. There shall be an Annual Fund toward which each member will donate according to his ability.

Section 3. The steering committee of the Alumni Association may suggest a minimum quota to the local units.

Section 4. The steering committee may suggest minimum quotas to individuals not members of the local units.

Article IX—Officers of the Local Units

Section 1. Five members of the Alumni Association may organize and upon recommendation of the executive secretary be recognized as a chapter.

Article X—Amendments

Section 1. Any proposed amendment to the Constitution may be handed, by February 1, to the executive secretary, who shall circulate it among the members of the association. Such amendment may be adopted by a three-fourth vote of those present at the annual meeting, to become effective immediately upon adoption.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to the by-laws may be adopted by a two-thirds majority of those present at any business meeting.

Article XI—Auditing

Section 1. The books of the financial secretary shall be audited by the person who audits the books of the college.

BY-LAWS

I. Duties of Officers

1. The duties of the president shall be to preside at the annual meeting of the Association, and at all meetings of the steering committee, and to fill by appointment any vacancies in the subordinate offices.

2. The duties of the vice-president shall be to preside in the absence of the president, to assume all duties of the president in case of vacancy, and to cooperate with the president in all measures for the good of the association.

3. The executive secretary shall be a salaried officer, the amount of the salary to be determined by the steering committee. He shall be the agent for carrying out the purpose of the Association, be the secretary of the meetings of the Association, and shall maintain the principal office as a business center for the work of the Association, where lists of the Alumni and index of their activities and the records of the Association may be kept.

4. Between the annual meetings of the Association, the business of the Association shall be conducted by the steering committee.

5. The duties of the financial secretary shall be to receive all monies for the Association and supervise collections.

6. The duties of the treasurer shall be to receive all monies from the financial secretary and to disburse all the monies of the Association under the direction of the steering committee, to keep account of all receipts and disbursements and to present a report of same at each annual meeting of the Association.

II. Duties of the Committees

1. The duties of the Finance Committee shall be to assist actively in any financial campaign in which the Association is interested.

2. The duties of the steering committee are to elect, employ and advise with the Alumni secretary in carrying on the work

of the Association.

III. Membership

1. Any student who has attended Atlantic Christian College for one year is a member of the Alumni Association.

2. All members of the Faculty of Atlantic Christian College shall be entitled to honorary membership.




