MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

This note is intended to be nothing more than a voice, but I hope the voice will be a challenge to every Alumnus of Atlantic Christian College.

The 24th session of the College is commencing this week, and it looks as if we are out for an "all-time high enrollment." We feel that the year is beginning in a very fine way, and the spirit of the student body is fine. But this splendid beginning is a challenge to us to do the things that are necessary to make the College worthy of its best.

As all of you know there is a special challenge to each of you now—a challenge that must be met at once—that of helping with the building of a chapel.

Some money has been given on this project during the year, but we are far from the \$25,000 needed for this building which is necessary in the life of the College.

We want every Alumnus to feel that he should help in this project, and we hope to crown the 24th session with the erection of this chapel.

It is our hope that every Alumnus will come as often as they can during the year to the College, that they will speak a good word for the College, and that they will help us in many ways in which their help is so badly needed.

The College has tried to help you in the past, will you not help the College now?

Let us extend the best wishes of all the College people to the Alumnus that they may have a good year in whatever they are undertaking to do.

Article IV—Officers and Elections

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be: president, vice-president, executive secretary, treasurer and financial secretary.

Section 2. A nominating committee for selecting nominees for officers shall be appointed by the president.

Section 3. The election of officers (except the executive secretary) shall be held at such annual meeting.

Section 4. The executive secretary shall be chosen by the steering committee and shall hold office at their discretion.

Section 5. The principal office of the Association shall be at Wilson, N. C.

Section 6. The local chapters shall have the right to establish local offices as they find need in connection with their chapters.

Section 7. The committees of the Association shall be the Finance committee and the steering committee.

Section 8. The executive secretary shall not be a member of the steering committee.

Section 9. The steering committee shall consist of the president, vice-president, treasurer, financial secretary, chairman of each local unit, and five members to be nominated by the nomination committee and elected by the Association.

Section 10. The regular business meetings of the Association shall be held annually at Homecoming Day and during commencement week each year and place as the steering committee may designate.

Section 11. The steering committee shall hold meetings whenever needed, the time and place to be designated by the president.

Section 12. The president may call a special meeting of the steering committee at any time he thinks necessary, by due notice to the members.

Section 13. There shall be no set dues for membership. Each former student is a member of the Association.

Section 14. There shall be an Alumni Fund toward which each member will donate according to his ability.

Section 15. The steering committee of the Alumni Association may suggest a minimum quota to the local units.

Section 16. The steering committee may suggest minimum quotas to individuals not members of the local units.

III. Quorum

Section 1. A quorum of the Association shall consist of 25 members of the Association.

Section 2. A quorum of the steering committee shall consist of five members. At all meetings of the steering committee the majority vote shall control. Where only a quorum is present it shall require three votes to transact any business (including disbursements of funds).

Section 3. A report from the financial secretary will appear in an early issue. The association owes a vote of thanks to Dr. Jarman who served so faithfully in a job that is not pleasant to fill, that of money collector. He is proud of the generosity of last year, in which more money was contributed to the association than in any previous year.

Article V—Meetings

Section 1. The regular business meetings of the Association shall be held annually at Homecoming Day and during commencement week each year and place as the steering committee may designate.

Section 2. The steering committee shall hold meetings whenever needed, the time and place to be designated by the president.

Section 3. The president may call a special meeting of the steering committee at any time he thinks necessary, by due notice to the members.

Article VI—Committees

Section 1. The committees of the Association shall be the Finance committee and the steering committee.

Section 2. The executive secretary shall not be a member of the steering committee.

Section 3. The steering committee shall consist of the president, vice-president, treasurer, financial secretary, chairman of each local unit, and five members to be nominated by the nomination committee and elected by the Association.

Article VII—Amendments

Section 1. Any proposed amendment to the Constitution may be handed, by February 1, to the executive secretary, who shall circulate it among the members of the Association. Such amendment may be adopted by a three-fourth vote of those present at the annual meeting, to become effective immediately upon adoption.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to the by-laws may be adopted by a two-thirds majority of those present at any business meeting.

Article XI—Auditing

Section 1. The books of the financial secretary shall be audited by the person who audits the books of the college.

BY-LAWS

I. Duties of Officers

1. The duties of the president shall be to preside at the annual meeting of the Association, and at all meetings of the steering committee, and to fill by appointment any vacancies in the subordinate offices.

2. The duties of the vice-president shall be to preside in the absence of the president, to assume all duties of the president in case of vacancy, and to cooperate with the president in all measures for the good of the association.

3. The executive secretary shall be a salaried officer, the amount of the salary to be determined by the steering committee. He or she shall be the agent for carrying out the purpose of the Association; be the secretary of the meetings of the Association, and shall maintain the principal office as a business center for the work of the Association where lists of the Alumnus and index of their activities and the records of the Association may be kept.

4. Between the annual meetings of the Association, the business of the Association shall be conducted by the steering committee.

5. The duties of the financial secretary shall be to receive all moneys for the Association and supervise collections.

6. The duties of the treasurer shall be to receive all moneys from the financial secretary and to disburse all the moneys of the Association under the direction of the steering committee; to keep account of all receipts and disbursements and to present a report of same at each annual meeting of the Association.

II. Duties of the Committees

1. The duties of the Finance Committee shall be to assist actively in any financial campaign in which the Association is interested.

2. The duties of the steering committee shall be to elect, employ and advise with the Alumni Secretary (carrying on the work

COLLEGE PRESS CONVENTION IN RALEIGH THIS FALL

STATE COLLEGE ACTS AS HOST

The North Carolina Collegiate Press Association will hold its thirty-fourth semi-annual convention in Raleigh this fall, and North Carolina State College will be host to the convention. The Spring convention was held at High Point last April, with High Point College acting as host for the occasion.

The purpose of the Collegiate Press Convention is to bring all of the publication leaders of North Carolina together, to give their ideas and suggestions for the betterment of college publications. At the assembly group meetings are held for editors and business managers of newspapers, yearbooks and magazines. It is always beneficial to the staff officials to meet together and get new ideas about how to improve their publications.

To encourage the improvement of college publications there are given three prizes for the best publications in Class B and three for the three best in Class A. The schools considered as Class A are all those with an enrollment of one thousand or more.

The cost of a school becoming a member of the N. C. C. P. A. is the registration fee for the college newspaper, magazine, or annual one year. For each publication the registration fee is five dollars and two and one half dollars for each member over two for each publication.

At these press conventions not only are there editors and business managers, but representatives of printing companies and national advertisers. It is usually at the conventions that the

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THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION OF ATLANTIC CHRISTIAN COLLEGE

Article I—Name

This organization shall be called the Alumni Association of Atlantic Christian College.

Article II—Purpose

The purposes for which the organization is formed are to aid, strengthen, and expand in every proper and useful way Atlantic Christian College and its work; and to develop, strengthen and utilize the bonds of interest, sympathy, and affection existing between the College and its Alumnus, and among the Alumni themselves.

Article III—Membership

1. Any student who has attended Atlantic Christian College for one year is a member of the Alumni Association.

2. All members of the Faculty of Atlantic Christian College shall be entitled to honorary membership.
