## Honor Society Formed for Men and Women; Ten Charter Members

Organization Replaces Alpha Delta Chi Honor Society

Ogrodowski Elected President

Jenkins and Prof. Jarman Elected Faculty Sponsors

For the past two years, there has been on the campus of Atlantic Christian College an organization for women, known as the Alpha Delta Chi Honor Society. On May 16, 1938, this organization was replaced by a newly-formed men's and women's honor society to be known as The Honor Knot Honor Society.

The purpose of this organization is to uphold the traditions and standards of the college, and to recognize and encourage (1) integrity of character, (2) scholarship, (3) constructive leadership, and (4) service. In order to qualify for membership, students must have an average of 85 for men and 87.5 for women, based on the two preceding semesters at Atlantic Christian College, and show evidence of integrity of character and leadership.

At a regular chapel service, conducted by the Golden Knot Honor Society between the 1st and the 2nd of May, each year, invitations to be issued by means of the "tapping system", which shall consist of tapping with a wand on the shoulder of the prospective member, as indicated by rising and holding the tapper to a designated spot with the members of the Honor Society. The ritual which will be performed will complete the initiation of members.

The expenses of membership shall involve only nominal dues. The charter members include the members of the former Alpha Delta Chi Honor Society, as follows: Sarah Bain Ward, Margaret Hamlin, Vivian Griffin, Madeline Cox, Mary Cox, Estelle Carter, and George Fulghum, Griffith Hamlin.

As the Commencement Play, THE Dramatic Club will present THE LATE CHRISTOPHER BEAN by Sidney Howard. This is a comedy in three acts designed especially for school and Little Theatre groups.

The play centers around Abby (Sarah Green), the maid of the Hagggett family, which consists of Dr. Hagggett (John Yavorski), Mrs. Hagggett (Virginia Atkinson), and their daughters Ada (Martha Brinson), and Susan (Leona Sultan). Other characters are Tallant, a forger (Robert Windham), Rossen, an art collector (Ray Silverthorne), Maxwell Davenport, an art critic (Dalton Kennedy), and Warren Cramer, the lover of Susan, (Robert Johnson).

Christopher Bean, a poor boy, who painted in his spare time, was a patient of Dr. Hagggett's. Bean died ten years before the play opens. As the action progresses, we find that critics have realized that Chris Bean was a fine artist, and his canvases are in great demand. All of his pictures were left at the Hagggett's when he died. They have been used for various purposes; to stop leaks in the windows of the house, to patch the roof of the chicken coop, and Ada has painted a picture of her own on the back of one of them. After being offered thousands of dollars for these pictures, there ensues a mad scramble on the part of the Hagggett family to find the remaining canvases. It then comes to light that Mrs. Hagggett had started a bon fire with over a dozen of them.

Honorable mention in Class A went to the Duke Chronicle; honorable mention in Class B to the Collegiate of Atlantic Christian College.

The Magazine awards went to State College and Davidson College; yearbook awards were received by State College and Flora McDonald.

The Collegiate rated fair in treatment, news stories, and features; good in balance, vitality, originality, copyreading, headlines, typography, front page make-up, inside make-up, editorial column, editorial features, and sports; and excellent in coverage and superior in printing.

The press association elected Walter James of Duke University as president and voted to have the fall convention at Duke University.

Dr. Finis S. Idleman, pastor of Central Christian Church of New York City, will be the speaker at the 36th annual commencement of Atlantic Christian College to be held May 23, at 10:30, in the college gymnasium.

Dr. Idleman, an outstanding churchman in the United States, was graduated from Eureka College; studied at Chicago University, and received his doctor's degree from Drake University. He has been minister in New York City for the past twenty-three years and has been connected with world peace movements, the Federal Council of Churches of America, and with Christianity movements throughout the United States and Europe. For a number of years he has been a member of the executive committee of the World Alliance for Friendship. Dr. Idleman has spoken in Wilson a number of times before.

"Moving Up Day" will be carried out in the usual manner on Tuesday, May 17, in the gymnasium at the regular chapel period. On this day each class moves up and takes the place of the next class. President Hilley will preside over this exercise.

Commencement activities will begin Saturday, May 21, at 10:30, with Class Day exercises. For the first time the exercises will be formal and the members of the graduating class will wear caps and gowns. The Sophomore Class will lead the Seniors in and carry the daisy chain as usual. The college band, under the direction of Millard Burt will give a band concert.
