### Publicity Plans Are Announced By Group

Miss Nackos Heads Publicity Committee

Every year a group of Atlantic Christian College students and a few faculty members get together for the purpose of forming a committee for publicity.

Miss Mary J. Nackos, a faculty member, is the chairman of the publicity committee this year. She has divided her committee into six sections. These sections are radio, weekly column in the *Wilson Daily Times*, church news, news in general, personals, and sports. For each section there is a faculty adviser.

Virginia Lancaster and George Yionoulis with Miss Nackos as their faculty adviser have charge of the radio sections. Naomi Morris, Julia Gliarmis, and Bill Osborne with Miss Nackos again as their faculty adviser have charge of the weekly column in the *Wilson Daily Times*. Ruth Blizzard, Ruby Jones, and Charlie Harrison with Mr. Hamlin as their faculty adviser have charge of the Church news. Mary Louise Rose and C. D. Gurganus with Miss Peele as their faculty adviser have charge of the news in general. Eleanor Jones and Frances Hemby with Mr. Smith as their faculty adviser have charge of the personals. Vincent Colombo and his assistant Penny Soufas have complete charge of the sports.

### Orientation Aids Freshman Group

Classes in Freshman Orientation, which is required of all students, both Commercial and A.B., have been started. The committee in charge of this year's one semester course is composed of Professor F. F. Grim, Professor C. A. Jarman, Dean Eva Whitley, Dr. Eliz. Hartsock, Professor Perry Case. Classes meet two thirty minute periods a week, in groups from twenty to thirty students, with a supervisor for each group. There are five groups in this year's freshman class.

This course is designed to aid freshman in making college adjustments. Topics, selected by the students, are discussed in the classrooms for two or three meetings. Then the material uncovered in these discussions is presented to the entire student body in chapel. Sometimes this is done with the aid of an outside speaker, or by plays or skits by the students. Any novel and educational work may be used. Topics that have been selected this year are:

Health and Hygiene, How to Study, Table, Public, and Campus Etiquette, Ideals of A. C. C., Vocations, Man and His Money, Personal and Organized Religion, Philosophy, Students and War, Man and Woman Relationships.

Other topics may be chosen, as students and supervisors see fit.

### Girl's Chorus Takes Place of Glee Club

The Music Department has a bright outlook for this year. Professor John W. Fontaine, who has been in the department for many years, and Professor Eugene Grove, who came to the college last year, are working to make the year a most successful and a most interesting one for the music students.

Under Professor Fontaine's direction, a Girl's Chorus has been organized to take the place of the Glee Club of previous years. The Chorus will travel over Eastern North Carolina giving programs in the various Christian churches. In connection with the Girl's Chorus, Professor Fontaine has formed a male quartet.

Professor Grove has formed a Student Ensemble, including both men and women.

The definite program for the remainder of the year has not, as yet, been announced. Margaret Garriss and Howard James plan to give their own individual recitals, and Professor Fontaine and Professor Grove have plans for their own recitals also. The various student groups will sponsor recitals during the year.
