Honor Society Sponsors Students Day Nov. 17

International Students Day will be observed by the students of Atlantic Christian College on Tuesday, November 17. This occasion is being sponsored by the Golden Knot Honor Society. Beginning on Tuesday and continuing through Friday, the students will sponsor a drive to raise money to send to the International Students Fund, a fund the purpose of which is to help students who have in some way or other partly lost their opportunity to further their education.

International Students Day is observed in remembrance of the closing of the Czech Universities and the brutal murder of over 160 Czech students by the Nazis in Prague on November 17, 1939.

The plans for the week have been definitely worked out. On Tuesday at 10:30 John McMillan, a student from Wake Forest College will address the student body. At exactly 11:00 o'clock, two minutes of prayer will be observed by everyone gathered in the chapel. Beginning after adjournment from this assembly, the members of the Society are asking that every student make it a point to give as much as he possibly can during the following three days to the support of the Service Fund.

On Wednesday, November 11, the Society took charge of the Atlantic Christian College radio program and presented the essence of the week's plans then.

Collegiate Prints New Cut System

A new system for dealing with class and chapel cuts was announced some time ago. For the use of those who may wish to refer to the statements made in reference to the issue, the Collegiate prints a summary here.

There will no longer be any such thing as taking extra courses for overcuts.

After a student's first cut, he must see the teacher; after his second, he must see Mr. Case; after his third he must appear before the classification committee and get a readmission slip. If a student is forced to drop courses, the classification committee and the faculty will be the final arbiters in deciding whether or not a student remains in school.

For physical education the same procedure for warning a student will be used. It was announced that cuts already made at that time could be made up and that students who had not already registered for physical education would be compelled to do so at once.

For chapel, it was announced that chapel was still compulsory and that four cuts will be allowed each semester. Warnings will be given a student when it appears that he has overcut chapel assembly. Readmissions and excused absences must be received from the Registrar. The old system
