Miss Katherine Lewis Is Elected President

ARE FILLED

Miss Katherine Lewis has been elected new president of the Atlantic Christian College Co-operative Association. This announcement was made immediately following an election held by the students Tuesday, April 6, after a run-off election between Miss Lewis and Miss Earle Williams.

Miss Lewis succeeds Elizabeth Browning, who has served as president of the student body the second semester.

Other officers of campus organizations were named in an election held on Tuesday, April 13.

Earle Williams defeated Avis Keene to become vice-president of the association. She succeeds Naomi Morris.

Elizabeth White succeeds Cassie Mae Cowell as secretary of the student association and Howard James follows Aaron Fussell as treasurer. Both these candidates were unopposed for the position.

In the publications department Mary Louise Rose, unopposed also, succeeds Katherine Lewis as editor of the college year book, The Pine Knot.

Managing the business end of the Pine Knot work will be Mary Jennette who won over Jeanne Hilley.

Ada Kathryn Coor will head the college paper, The Collegiate for the ensuing year. She was opposed by Dorothy Greene.

The office of Chief Marshal will be filled by Charlotte Thomas who eliminated Becky Cockerell from the race.

Dr. Mildred Hartsock will be one of the faculty representatives on the executive board.

The office of chairman of May Day will be filled in later elections. At this writing the elections slate shows that there will be a run-off for office of business manager of the Collegiate between Dixie Smith and Joyce Barnes, and one for a second faculty representative on the board between Miss Mary J. Nackos and Mrs. H. D. Mercer.
